Landcare is a nationwide network of volunteer community groups undertaking restoration and sustainable management of our natural resources: water, land and vegetation.

There are over 4000 autonomous community Landcare groups around Australia.

Landcare groups are made up of a variety of people, from all age groups and are found in both rural and urban areas. These groups often bring together people from vastly different backgrounds all working towards a common goal and caring for their land.

Landcare is also seen as helping bridge the gaps within and between communities and developing friendships and trust which are the backbones of all communities.
